Who's Who and What's What ...

A t long last, we are finally nearing the end of what has been a brutal slog of an election season that has offered a lot more heat than light, and a lot less substance and civility than this country deserves. It has, at times, felt like the civic equivalent of a root canal without Novocain. I'm pretty certain that, somewhere, Miss Cleary - my 9th grade civics teacher, who taught me to love

and respect the way our democratic system is intended to work - is sadly shaking her head.

One of the laments we've heard over and over these last several months - maybe, even, these last several years - is that "our politics is broken." I'm inclined to believe it's true. As a citizen, I'm discouraged by that. As a Christian, I'm convinced that the church's reconciling mission in this world is now more relevant than ever. As author Marshall Shelley recently observed, when fear and loathing are two primary characteristics of a culture, the task for followers of Jesus isn't easy - but it is clear. "When the vitriolic presidential campaign is over and the election is settled," he writes, "it promises to leave almost half the population fearful that whoever wins will lead the country to ruin. The fear of the losing side is likely to exceed the hopeful anticipation of the winning side."

What does that mean for us?

It means, argues Tod Bolsinger, author of *Canoeing the Mountains*, that the church has an opportunity "to demonstrate a life of witness and unity that is a radical alternative to our increasingly polarized and reactionary culture." Churches that reflect the new reality of Galatians 3:28 and embody the unity of John 14 "will offer the world a glimpse today of the way the world will

someday be." The apostle Paul put it like this in 2 Corinthians 5:18: "All this is from God, who reconciled Himself to us through Christ, and has given us this ministry of reconciliation." What God has done for us through the love and mercy of Jesus, we are to model in our lives and relationships and community, being agents of grace to a culture in bondage to fear and loathing.

Providentially, I think, a month that begins with what promises to be a divisive election, ends with some powerful reminders about who's who and what's what and how God's people are to be oriented in this world. November 20th is Christ the King Sunday, when we celebrate the good news that Jesus reigns over all the nations of the world and that, one day, at His name, "every knee should bend in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord" (Philippians 2:10-11). On November 24th, we join our fellow citizens in a day of Thanksgiving for what God has done in blessing us far more richly and abundantly than we deserve. Then, on November 27th, the season of Advent begins, in which we remember how God once came to be with us as one of us - and promises to return one day in power and glory. God has given us a ministry of reconciliation.

November 8th will most likely remind us once again why such a ministry is so necessary in a world where there are very deep, very wide divisions that can only be reconciled by the kind of love and humility that Jesus makes possible. If that's the challenge, then the days to come later this month - November 20th, 24th, and 27th will remind us that God has not left us to pursue this hard work of reconciliation alone and without hope. These days of celebration, thanksgiving, and anticipation remind us that God rules, God provides, and God loves us enough to come, be with us, and share our lives with us. That's good news. Now, let's do something with it.

May the peace of Christ be with you!

Enthusiasm in Spite of Tension

"I, Tertius, the writer of this letter, greet you in the Lord" Romans 16:22

A favorite Bible Study question of mine is "Who wrote Romans?" As the scripture above makes clear, it was Tertius, not Paul.

Paul spoke the words as Tertius, the scribe - the welleducated pen behind

the text - recorded them. He then later re-wrote them in the clear, organized form we have today. The thoughts and words are Paul's; the careful grammar and order can be attributed to Tertius.

It may well be that Tertius' eyes twinkled with a thankful smile remembering a congregation of friends, brothers and sisters in Christ. Or did he know them? It is also possible that they had never met. Perhaps they were simply connected from Ephesus or Corinth to Rome by the strong ties of the Gospel message they

were each seeking to live out. They were brothers and sisters in the body of Christ.

We have no idea of his relationship with them. But, from this bizarre insertion, unique as far we know to all the rest of the Bible - this carefree breaking of the rules of literary circumspection and scribal

ethics, this beautiful, unbounded, heartfelt example of uncontainable enthusiasm for partners in the gospel on the other side of the Roman Empire - here blossoms a blessed example of what the Spirit of God birthed in the

> hearts of men and women whose lives had been changed.


The background to these words also bears remembering. Paul's words and Tertius' enthusiasm fall against a time of terrible tension. The early church was at a disconcerting impasse over Christians who began as Jews and Christians who began as Gentiles. Distrust, misunderstanding, suspicion and anger were palpable among those early believers.

Tertius' perspective therefore, carries an even timelier weight. In this time of divisive rhetoric and deep social concerns, let us, the church, reclaim his bold intrusion of enthusiastic faith. Let us, too, work to unite brothers and sisters across the miles. Let us, like Tertius, greet one another in the Lord with the perspective and

power of the Gospel. And let us do this also, as people of peace, with the vision of hope, doing the hard and beautiful work of love.



Share the Peace - Not the Germs...

Revised from the original article: "Pass the Peace - Not the Germs" (November 2014)

As we approach another flu season, let us once again consider what it means to share the Peace of Christ – from the standpoint both of worship practice and of health awareness.

First, let us consider what it means for us to share the Peace of Christ as a worshipping congregation of Christian believers. Theologian James White says, "we cannot touch God, but each of us can touch others in God's name ... the passing of the peace has again become a prominent sign of reconciliation and love as Christians embrace one another or shake hands during worship." The exchange of peace is different from the "greet your neighbor time." It is a specific act of worship meant to encourage one another in the comforting thought that Christ is present and among us – bringing peace (Matthew 18:20). This act of worship actually comes from the New Testament practice of sharing the Kiss of Peace, in which fellow Christians offered one another a simple kiss in worship to signify reconciliation and oneness (see, for example, Romans 16:16; 1 Corinthians 16:20; and 1 Peter 5:14). One of the early church fathers, Cyril of Jerusalem (314-387 A.D.) gives specific pastoral instruction for the Kiss of Peace. "Do not think of this kiss as being like the kiss people exchange in the public squares when they meet friends. No, this kiss is not of that kind. It unites souls, it requires that we forget all grudges. This kiss thus signifies the union of souls with one another, and the forgetfulness of all wrongs done us." This kiss, then, paralleling the words of Christ in Matthew 5:23-24, is an act of reconciliation.

For this reason, the Kiss of Peace (or Sharing of Peace) can most often be found near the Confession and Pardon in the order of worship. Participating in this act of worship is meant to stretch us. After all, forgiveness is not always easy. Perhaps this is why early Christians chose to symbolize this sort of risky vulnerability - and gracious acceptance - with the sharing of kiss. Augustine of Hippo (354-430 A.D.) describes it thusly: "This is a sign of peace; as the lips indicate, let peace be made in your conscience, that is, when your lips draw near to those of your brother, do not let your heart withdraw from his. Hence, these are great and powerful sacraments." Sharing signs of peace and love in worship should compel us to do the same outside the church. In worship every week, we practice and, in a sense, reenact God's story of salvation - a story filled with love and peace, hope and joy - so that, as the body of Christ, we are better prepared to go out and boldly share these signs of God's grace with the world.

That's some background on how Sharing the Peace of Christ became a part of traditional Christian worship. Nevertheless, with the weather turning colder and people inevitably getting sick, the practical question remains: How then are we to share signs of peace (handshakes, kisses, hugs) without sharing each other's germs? The best thing for us to do, I think, is to use our common sense - and trust others to do the same. Be aware of your surroundings, and take care of yourselves. I could elaborate here, but I think we all know the importance of good health awareness. Finally, allow others their space.

If you sense someone is holding back, perhaps they are simply

extending the courtesy of not sharing unwanted "guests" with you.

But, what of our time together in worship? Understanding the historical significance of the gesture, how then are we to supplement during this time of year? Perhaps we can look past the gesture alone and focus our attention on the words we use during this act of worship. There can be such wonderful compassion and love by speaking kind words of peace to our neighbors in worship while looking them in the eyes. It signifies that you are present with them in that moment and that all other things (at least for this brief time) can wait. While there is great importance in the combination of sign and spoken word, it seems obvious during this time of year that we place our emphasis on the latter. Just as the Apostle Paul encouraged the Christians in Rome to not be stumbling blocks for one another, so, too, can we seek to proactively "pursue what makes for peace and for mutual upbuilding" (Romans 14:19).

It is my hope that you will find renewal and reconciliation as you share these loving words: May the Peace of Christ be always with you.
